Lee Miller's trek in Nepal 2024

As most of you know, I traveled to Nepal last November to do a trek with my friend Bryn in the Himalayas. We were walking for $3\frac{1}{2}$ weeks up in the mountain valleys of Tsum and Nubri, including doing a circuit around Mt Manaslu, the 8^{th} highest mountain in the world. We were returning to the same places we had walked in 2015, immediately before the earthquake there. The region is close to the Tibetan border and at one point was a part of that country. It is still steeped in the culture of Tibet and Tibetan Buddhism. With no roads, the mountain trails are the only ways to reach these valleys, which made it easy to feel that we were escaping our everyday lives. And walking the same paths as everyone else allows us to feel a part of life there. It was a magical trip, every bit as inspiring as the last time we had journeyed there. From Ali: A Story for Our time

A fable from the book of Kalileh and Demneh

Kelileh o Demneh is a collection of fables. Its origin goes back to a Sanskrit text dating to 200 BC. It was translated into Middle Persian in the sixth century by Borzuya Pezeshk and from Persian to Arabic in the eight century by the Persian scholar Ibn Al Moqaffe. In the 18th century it was translated into Georgian, and as time went on into many languages with accompanying illustrations.

The book consists of fifteen chapters containing fables whose heroes are animals. Lion is the king and Ox is his servant. Many stories are narrated by two jackals called Kalileh and Demneh, who are the lion's ministers. Demneh is a wicked minister who is after power and status and tries to scare the lion concerning issues about which the lion has no knowledge or experience, explaining matters in a way that adds to the lion's fear. Demneh says he loves the country and the lion in order to increase his status and position. Kalilah is a benevolent and good-natured minister who constantly warns Demneh against this by telling him stories of evil and bad deeds and trying to convince him to do what he advices using solid reasons and wise stories.

Lynn and Chuck Lidz have been actively protesting the painful overreach of the current administration. Lynn shared photos of protests they've attended in Boston.




